Healing Relationships

The 2014 Rocky Mountain Annual Conference meeting was held in Pueblo this year, which facilitated the pilgrimage to the site of the Sand Creek Massacre, near Eads, CO. The theme of healing relationships was personified by that pilgrimage and all other activities of the conference enhanced that theme. Think about it: Everything we do is based on relationships and without healing; the rifts between us grow into huge chasms that separate us from each other and from God. With representatives from 260 churches across our conference, our bishop began her Episcopal address by citing a conversation she had had last year with the 2013 keynote speaker, Brian McLaren. At that time, he had asked her, "Who's planning to keep your church together?" Because of the furor surrounding the subject of homosexuality, the United Methodist Church is closer now to schism than we've been since the Civil War era. Some want to ignore the issue. Some want to remain together and let individual congregations decide how to handle it. Some are talking of splitting the church, much as it was during the Civil War. Bishop Elaine Stanovsky boldly stated that there is no precedent in the teachings of Jesus for separation. Jesus preached unity. John Wesley sought unity of hearts, even opinions differed. Dietrich when Bonhoeffer asked how anyone could walk away when we believe all are loved. Powerful opening. She cited the scripture from the John 14:2 where we find Jesus stating that in God's house, there are many rooms. She asked, "Is there not room for all?" And from there she went right into the acts of repentance and the fact that

I won't go into more detail here about the pilgrimage as those who attended the barb-que on June 29 have already heard all about it. If you weren't there and would like to know more, see Shirley Greener, Elaine Johnsen, Sharon Clayton, or me. We were deeply touched by our experiences and would love to tell you more about the pilgrimage.

I do want to mention that our founding pastor, Bruce Grauberger, was among those remembered at the memorial service. We visited with Joyce. She sent her love to all. Healing relationships is an ongoing goal of all of us. While we are all as varied as pebbles on the shore, together we are a mighty force for good in the world.
