- \$43 will cover the cost of one week of tuition for a preschooler in the McCurdy Ministries faith-based preschool
- \$55 will cover a week of tuition for a child to participate in Camp Stars in the summer of 2015
- \$40 will help two children participate in the Big Buddy/Little Buddy program
- \$10 will pay monthly expenses for one of the 15 peer mediators on campus

Heifer Project International began in 1944. Now in 125 countries around the globe, Heifer Project International has provided livestock and training for more than 20 million families. HPI helps hungry people feed themselves, earn income, and care for the environment. Each family gives one of the offspring of their animal to another family, thereby sharing with others in their community.


- \$10 buys a share of a sheep for a Navajo reservation
- \$20 provides a share of a llama or alpaca for Peru
- \$30 supplies honeybees for people in Ukraine
- \$60 pays for trees seedlings for Haiti (\$10 is one share)
- \$60 provides a trio of rabbits for Nepal (\$10 is one share)
- \$50 buys a biogas stove which runs on methane gas from animal waste, instead of wood from diminishing forests
- \$10 provides a share of a pig for Appalachia in the USA
- \$10 is the cost of a goat for India
- \$50 buys a share of a heifer for Albania
- \$20 supplies flocks of chicks, ducks, or geese in the Philippines
- You may also choose other animals and/or gifts from the HPI catalog

## <u>Treasure - Church-wide Study begins in November</u>

Good Shepherd folks are participating in a church-wide study on faith and money as part of the 2015 Stewardship Campaign called Celebrating Our Treasures. A book of daily devotional readings written by Jacob Armstrong uses the Sermon on the Mount to reexamine what our treasure is. How do we spend our time, energy, and money? Only 100 pages, the little guide is designed both for individual reading and group use. Participants will explore ways in which generosity and financial challenges in their personal lives can affect relationships with people and with God. Rev. Terilynn Russ will parallel her Sunday messages with the treasure theme. The Insights adult Sunday school class, which meets in the conference room, will be using the book and a companion DVD developed by the author.
